

Rekindle the Torch of Friendship

From early observations with light, the ancient Greeks saw light traveling through rays and noticed that those rays refracted through less denser mediums such as water. They also discovered that when those rays hit a surface they would reflect back. This way the light ray had a chance to return.

A torch is merely a portable holder in which to carry the source of light. The holder is usually rod shaped and has an opening in which to carry the flame. Our focus this year should be on the flame and friendships past and present.

Red (Courage), yellow (Vision), blue (Humility), orange (Loyalty), green (Fellowship), violet (Service).

I. Colors of Light

Red = danger or warning, fiery heat and action, confidence, courage and vitality. It is a warm color and is most often the choice by males and outward people. The red rose represents love. Ruby rings are said to be worn on the left hand.

Orange = Known as a color of power, fiery heart and healing

II. The Guiding Light

This is known as the divine presence of a person or thing and also the spirit of that individual.

This could also mean a person that inspires you. Why not do a program on a sister that has inspired you or a friend that has helped bring that inspiration to you?

III. Find the light at the end of the tunnel

Think of ways to help others in need and find their light or your own light to a path you or they seek in service.

IV. People Embrace and are Guided by their Light and Colors

The colors of the flag are a rallying point for soldiers. Each color is given its own meaning. The blue in the American flag stands for that of liberty. Red stands for the blood that was shed or brotherhood.

YEARBOOK/PROGRAMS/SOCIALS – can be centered around the use of flames in our culture, history, religion and their meanings. An idea might be to do a camping theme for the year with logs on the fire and different colored flames in front of a tent. Take the sisters to the Olympics for a program and show them the past torches, why they were made and the meanings behind them. Or, put different types and styles of torches in your yearbooks. (The Beijing Olympic Games this summer feature a flame character.) Another idea would be to center the year around a Luau complete with Lilo and Stitch, the two best friends. TIKI torches could dress each page of the yearbook. Use light and lanterns during your socials to reflect the flame. A torch is also a symbol of leadership (relating to past experience) to pass on to others, so a program could be on famous women leaders in history that inspired us. Or, focus your year on those who will follow you of which will be **the legacies**. Torch songs could be played and reviewed at a meeting. Flaming desserts could be served at each gathering. Light fires during the cold months of the meetings this year.

The torch is a beloved symbol of our sisterhood because it is a symbol of learning. And learning is very much a part of who and what we are in Beta Sigma Phi. It is SIGMA - part of our motto.

One night, the great star was watching below for a glimmer of its lost child and there it flashed! Soon it moved on. In fact, it seemed to pass along a never ending trail. It now became obvious it had been fashioned into a torch and was passed along from one heart who needed it to another. With the torch, all who seek the Good, True and Beautiful will find it!"

Why a torch? Because we, as Beta Sigma Phi's, seek what it teaches. We are guided by it so we ourselves can be a guide to others.

HOW TO MAKE FIREPLACE FLAMES

Explains what ingredients and chemicals go together to make colored flames in the fireplace.

- 3 parts Potassium sulphate (Chromealum) and 1 part potassium nitrate (Salt Peter) for violet flames
- Strontium chloride for red flames
- Calcium chloride (bleaching powder) for blue flames
- Magnesium sulphate (Epson Salts) for white flames
- Baronsalts (Borax) for yellowish-green flames
- Copper sulphate (blue vitrol/Bluestone) for green flames
- Sodium chloride (table salt) for yellow flames

Please read the information on the site and consult someone that is an expert at burning things in the fireplace before trying this.

STRING UP COLORED LIGHTS



If you want to stay away from flames for safety reasons, use colored light bulbs.

HOST A CAMP FIRE – SOCIAL



Enjoy a camp type social complete with tents and BBQ's.

Before the social, make camp fire invitations with twigs (for kindling) glued on top.

Or, use back pack key chains as invitations with the invite written on paper and place inside.

To the Entrance of the yard have Beta Sigma Phi Camp Grounds painted on a piece of wood and hung.

Next to the entrance sign post the camp rules on a board.

Everyone can be given a visor made for them, or they can make and decorate theirs at the party. Just supply markers, glue and decorations.

Have the guests bring tents or you supply one or two. Set up tables with paper clothes taped down in and around the area along with BBQ's for grilling.

Provide the condiments to dress the burgers, hot dogs and bratwurst. Relish, pickles, mustard, catsup, onions, relish and hot sauce will do.

For dessert provide skewers with marshmallows, chocolate bars and graham crackers in them in order to make s'mores for dessert. If you have a fire pit set up and available, the guest can sit around and make their desserts.





Play "Who's Feet Are They?"



Have the guests dig for treasure in a wading pool or two set up.


Make a volcano cake and place a sparkler on top.



SOCIAL OR GATHERING USING A TORCH THEME


Place Cards.

Cut stiff white paper twice the height you want the finished product to be. With pastels, water colors, or any drawing tool, shape a torch in the left center. Mark the card, around the torch, for a horizontal fold. Then cut around the half of the drawing above the fold. When you make the fold, you have a torch that stands up.

Using the same basic white paper folded as a place card, you can instead attach a short piece of pipe cleaner to the top left corner. Attach the other end of the pipe cleaner to a torch cut from colored construction paper or card stock. Here you have a torch in relief


Φ Favors.

Use small ice cream cones to make pretty and appropriate place favors. For the base, use a small half ball of Styrofoam, resembling a gum drop in shape. Use gold spray-paint for both cone and base. Two thickness of cellophane, yellow over red, shaped into a pointed mound to resemble a flame, is inserted into the tops of the cones

Make simple, 3-dimensional architectural structures from construction paper. A door at the front opens to reveal a torch, also of construction paper, pasted to the back "wall." The flame can be cut of yellow crepe paper.

Φ Centerpieces.

Roses and candles go well together for centerpieces. Try delightful handlings such as hurricane lamps with yellow roses and greenery at the base, or tall, tall goblets into which fat candles (or votives in the various colors) have been tucked, along with roses and ivy tips. (Did you know that ivy symbolizes Friendship?)

There are hundreds of possibilities! Perhaps a decorated doorway at the entrance to your banquet (or specific activity), lettered with the words of the theme, will appeal to you. Or you may wish to use the colors of the torch's rays in some way, in candles or in floral decorations.
